SUMMARY

Owls are enigmatic yet magnificent creatures. Despite their status as a symbol of wisdom, they are subjected to superstition, illegal trade, and hunting. Many rumours describing owls negatively are prevalent in various parts of Nepal. Knowing this, Friends of Nature is dedicated to educating people in various parts of the country through various means. Nepal Owl Festival (NOF) is one of its kind, which is directly concerned about conservation and well-being of owls. This yearly event was halted due to covid-19 pandemic for two years. Conservationist around the nation were eagerly waiting for this unique event to happen, now the wait was over.

Calendar was marked for February 3rd and 4th 2023, and the venue for tenth Nepal Owl Festival was Maghi Village Homestay, Ghodaghodi Bird Sanctuary, Kailali. The festival is fusion of conservation, local culture, and traditional games. With the main objective of generating awareness among general public, the festival was organized in Nava Prabhat Basic School. The festival was attended by around 5500 local, students, researchers, and conservationists from different countries. The festival was also successful in raising awareness among 1904 students through conservation camps held at their school. Local tradition and culture, cuisines, games, art and crafts were seen to engage lots of visitors and the festival was seen effective to deliver conservation messages and ecological roles of owls.

OAL AND OBJECTIVE OF 'NEPAL OWL FESTIVAL'

The overall goal of the program was to enhance public participation in owl conservation in Nepal. The specific objectives were as follows

- 1. To discourage the hunting and trade of owls in Nepal by elevatingconservation awareness of local people, media, and political leaders
- 2. To enhance the local capacity in owl conservation via education program
- 3. To recognize the hidden conservation heroes and sheroes of Nepal
- 4. To promote traditional culture and games of the area
- 5. To promote eco-tourism in the area
- 6. To encourage and mentor young graduates for owl conservation viaopportunity of volunteering in the event

BACKGROUND

Nepal Owl Festival has been gradually expanding and evolving into multifaceted event since its inception in 2012 AD. The Nepal Owl Festival is celebrated in solidarity of the International Festival of Owls, which is celebrated in Houston, Minnesota every year in March.

Our aim was to take the festival to different parts of the country, where illegal hunting and trading has caused serious threat to the owl species. We create a fun festive atmosphere where people could access a variety of information about the species and interact with conservationist and vice-versa in order to raise awareness of the need to protect owls found in Nepal.

Although the main festival is a two-day event, our team members plan meticulously months in advance to find the ideal location and work in coordination with local agencies. A month before the event, our team in Kathmandu office simultaneously plans the festival site and makes all the essential festival preparations. The initial planning step includes making logistic plans and gathering festival display elements. Our staff and volunteer, who come from a variety of professional backgrounds, work tirelessly as a dedicated team to support and advance our work.

Local community members and representatives play a significant role in constructing and promoting the event, they work hand-in-hand with us to make the festival enjoyable and knowledgeable and so it is very crucial to establish good relation with local community. A festival management committee (one) and subcommittees (seven) are established after reaching an agreement with local organization/local community. This is followed by multiple meetings to apportion roles, to plan and to discuss event structure, venue and other aspect of the events.

We begin our social media promotions a few weeks before the events so that more people from all regions of Nepal world learn about it and be able to plan a potential weekend vacation. The event frequently attracts some curious foreign visitors, who visit us during the festival.

A few week before the festival, conservation awareness camps are held in schools around the village of festival site. Through an engaging and interactive presentation by our professionals, the young children's are educated about owls and their significance. For owl-themed poem and essays, an interschool competition was held. Winners of the competition are awarded during the festival and their work is displayed in the owl museum.

The team travels to the event site a few days beforehand to set up the venue after making sure everything is ready. We collaborate with local organizers at the venue, plan event components and work on schedules.


Finally, at the day of festival we celebrate together.

PROMOTION

The tenth event of Nepal Owl Festival was waited for two years due to covid-19 pandemic. There was excitement among local people and conservationist to participate in the event. The promotion started a month prior of the festival through social media sites, Radio Ghodaghodi, Radio Api FM, Kailali FM and online news portals.

Press conference was held on Dhangadi (27th Jan), the headquarter of Kailali district, with the aim to convey the conservation message and the information of the event to wider audience. There were 27 journalists in attendance from various local and national media outlets.

Promotion of the events was also done through social media sites and by installing event banners at different strategic locations. Furthermore, information about the event was broadcast through local FMs on daily basis.

FESTIVAL SITE: MAGHI HOMESTAY



Maghi Village is located in Ghodaghodi Municapility, Kailali district, just close to the Ghodaghodi lake. The village is at about 5.5 km distance from the Ghodaghodi Lake, about 624.3 km away from Kathmandu and 62.4 km from Dhangadi. Tharu are the main inhabitants of the area, so visitors can enjoy Tharu culture, cultural dances (Sakhiya, Laathi nach etc.) and local dishes.

Maghi village has the home-stay facilities i.e. Maghi community home-stay for domestic or foreign tourists. There are fifteen functioning home-stays with environmental friendly and responsible tourism practices. Major attraction of this village is the Ghodaghodi lake and Sita Kuwa temple.

Sal and Saaj are the major tree species in the village which is habitat for spotted deer, fishing cat, leopard cat, common leopard, monkey etc. Ghodaghodi lake complex is the first official bird sanctuary of Nepal. Thus the lake and surrounding is home to several avifaunal species i.e. Great Slaty Woodpeckers, the Great Hornbill, Darter, Jungle Owlet, Brown Fish Owl, Mallard, Ruddy Shelducks, Gadwall, Eurasian Teal etc.

CONSERVATION AWARENESS CAMPS

A couple of weeks prior to the festival, conservation awareness camps were held in 20 schools in and around festival sites of Maghi Homestay, Kailali. All schools/colleges of Ghodaghodi Municipality were visited to aware students about the importance of owls.

A total 1904 students were participated in 66 conservation camps. A survey was carried out with students participating in the camps. The results from the survey indicated the use of catapult by 392 students. Among the total students 751 had seen at least one species of owl, 325 students had heard their call and 29 students had even saw their eggs. Fraction of students (76) was aware about the illegal trade of owls. The survey also revealed 34 students had either killed or consumed the meat of owls.

Conservation camps were successful in delivering the message on ecological importance of owls and encouraged to help protect the species. Besides, the camps also aimed on eliminating the myths/superstition about owls and students were determined to stop the use of catapults.

INTER-SCHOOL COMPETITIONS

Interschool competitions were held for poem and essay writing on owls prior to the main festival event. Students from different schools participated in these competitions. Each school called for participation from among their students; evaluated and submitted their best entries to compete in the interschool competition.

We received the shortlisted essays and poems, which was evaluated by organizer. Top 3 entries in each category were selected as winners. The students were awarded with certificates and prize during the

NATIONAL ART COMPETITION


The tenth Nepal Owl Festival was a big event and full of surprises. The announcement for the national art competition was made in our Facebook page six months before the event. This national wide art competition was first of its kind, and we were very happy to see the huge number of participants from different parts of the country. It was conceptual owl art competition (social and cultural dimension) with conservation message on owls. The competition was targeted for those Nepalese students who are studying in grade 10 and below. The art was evaluated by the team of experts under three different themes: quality of the art, concept, and conservation message.

The result was announced before the festival and top ten art were exhibited in the owl museum. The winner of the competition was Achhata Dahal from Motherland High School, Pokhara. Aastha Singh from Creative Acadamy, Kirtipur and Peeyush Lamgade from Triyog Higher Secondary School, Kathmandu were first runner-up and second runner-up respectively. Winners were awarded with the prize money, certificate, token of love and arrangements to visit the festival.

BIRDING AND NATURE WALK

Nepal Owl Festival is a place where conservationist all around the nation gathers and participate in different activities. Birding/Nature walk started at early morning for two days (February 3 and 4) before the main event.

Any interested participants were free to join the birding with experts. Prior to birding participants were gathered and informed about the code of conducts.

A total of 86 locals, visitors, students and birders participated where they visited nearby forest and Ghodaghodi Lake, the first bird sanctuary of the country and recorded 64 species. The event was led by Mr. Manshanta Ghimire, a conservationist and founding president of Pokhara Bird Society, on both days.

CULTURAL PROGRAM

As Nepal Owl Festival is fusion of conservation and local culture, various local dances and games were performed in the event by different artist. Visitors were seen enjoying the local and traditional dances such as *Mangrahuwa dance, Sakhiya dance, Jhumra dance, Lathi dance, Hurdunga dance, Deuda game and Hudke dance*. It was pleasure to see the cultural diversity in the event although the main inhabitant of the village was Tharu community.

Conservation song of Maniram reflected the respect and urge towards nature conservation by local community. The major attraction of the event became the conservation dance performed by Institute of Forestry, Pokhara. Students performed flash mob ending with drama related to conservation of owls.

The event was successful to recall the traditional flavor through different games like *Sai Kichkich, Chur, Titi and Koili Didi*. Visitors were welcomed to the event by the *deuda* song which was written by Prof. Karan Bahadur Shah. *Deuda* is the popular dance form practiced in western Nepal in which a group of boys and girls gather and dance together. *Deuda* was sung by the team of Dipa Gurung and Ravi Bikram Shah. Music was carefully composed by Rajman Maharjan who played Harmonium; Bikash Ghimire and Mohan Buchha Magar added the music by Madal and Guitar respectively.

OWL MUSEUM

The main attraction of the festival, owl museum is the collection of curios, information, news, art and crafts,

This temporary museum created within four days prior to the main event is the result of hard work and dedication of volunteers who put forward their skills and creativity to convey the message on ecology and conservation of owl.

The museum contains the information about the news on owls, glimpse of previous owl festivals, museum specimens on owls and its prey, owl stories, demonstration of owl created from fruits and vegetables and much more. Visitors are seen spending majority of their time in these stuffs. Owl robots, owl call device and documentaries about owls of Nepal was seen quite engaging to the visitors. Museum was set in four different rooms (additional one room for conservation video) and 2-3 volunteers per room were available to clear any queries raised by the visitors.











OWL DART BOARD

Owl dart board is one of the fun stuffs of the festival. Children were seen gathering to the area where the dart board was set up. Two different dart board were placed at the wall which contains pictures of owls and a hunter. The rule was simple, hit the hunter for reward and hit the owl for fine.

Many people were gathered to test their luck and skills for a reward of owl mask, which will make them feel like a winner. Those who hit the owls donate voluntarily to contribute for next owl festival.


CONSERVATION SPEECH

Nepal Owl Festival is one of the biggest conservation events in the country. Different veteran researchers and conservationist throughout the nation participate and deliver conservation speech to highlight more about nature and environment.

Conservation speech was delivered by Rajendra Narshing Suwal (Partnership Development Head, WWF Nepal), Keshab Parajuli and Gokul Rijal (Divisional Forest Officer, Kailali), Raju Acharya (Country Representative, World Owl Trust, UK), DR Chaudhary (President, Bird Conservation Network) and Dr. Satish A. Pande (Managing Director, ELA Foundation, India). There were at least ten local politician/representative of local government who deliver their speech on what can be done locally to contribute to conservation.

ORGANIZATION STALLS

Owl Festival is an opportunity for different International, National, and local organizations to promote and advertise their works. We provide spaces for these organization to sale/distribute their products in the festival.

Bird Conservation Nepal, Himalayan Nature, Pokhara Bird Society, Nepal Ornithological Union, Bird Conservation Nepal, Pokhara Branch were some of the national organizations to set their stalls. This year we also had space for ELA Foundation from India to publicize their work. Likewise, there were several local stalls which sell items exclusive to Tharu culture. Beautiful art and crafts made from wood was the attraction of Bhatta Merit Kastha Udhyog. People were seen to gather around these stalls to buy souvenirs and to get informed about the activities done by each organization.

Friends of Nature also managed to set up small stall in the festival. Different items related to owl and the festival such as ball pen, masks, cup, keyring, t-shirt, tote bags were displayed and sold. The amount collected from the stall shall contribute to organize next Nepal Owl Festival.

Awardees for this year were Govinda Bahadur Singh, Hem Bahadur Katuwal, Ramesh Kumar Poudel and Satish A. Pande (right to left)

WINNERS PROFILE

Govinda Bahadur Singh

Govinda Bahadur Singh is a Veterinary Officer at Barekot Village Municipality, Jajarkot by his profession. However, his passion motivated him to dwell into nature and click amazing photographs of wildlife and landscapes, as a result, Barekot is now a famous name among nature enthusiasts in the country. He has been conducting wildlife research, and conservation, rescue operations, conservation sensitization and awareness programs using his own resources.



Mr. Singh has documented 72 nests of Himalayan Griffon, 9 nests of Bearded Vulture, 4 nests of Egyptian Vulture, and 1 nest of Red-headed

Vulture from 6 districts of Jajarkot to Humla. Further, he has documented Cheer Pheasant from Jajarkot, Rukum and Jumla districts. Furthermore, he has been active in rescue and rehabilitation of wildlife. So far, he has successfully rescued 32 birds, one Himalayan Black Bear cub, one Otter, six Himalayan Gorals, nine Barking deer, two Leopard Cats, two Bats, and four Snakes. In the past 10 years, he has removed a total of 260 iron made snares and 400 bird traps from different forests.

Mr. Singh has conducted 20 conservation camps at school levels and 30 sensitization programs at community levels so far. He has published 5 scientific articles and shared his conservation opinions in dozens of newspapers and FM stations. His conservation camps are mostly centered around owls and their conservation, so far, he has published three articles on owls. Mr. Singh has sighted and monitored six nests of owls including nationally vulnerable species namely Rock Eagle Owl and Brown Fish Owl.

Hem Bahadur Katuwal

Hem Bahadur Katuwal has completed his PhD in "Ecology and Conservation of Farmland Birds in Nepal" from Chinese Academy of Sciences. He is a post-doctoral research fellow at Xishuangbanna Tropical Botanical Garden, Chinese Academy of Sciences, China.



He spent 12 years of his life serving at Small Mammals Conservation and Research Foundation and Bird Conservation Nepal. He is passionately conducting research and conservation of Chinese Pangolin, Bengal Florican,

and farmland birds. He has conducted conservation camps for 2000 students and 2000 farmers. He is the first-person discovering threats to Yellow-breasted Bunting.

Mr. Katuwal has published 34 scientific articles including 21 articles in journals with impact factor. As a result of his research contribution, two sites of Sarlahi and Dhanusha Districts have been listed as "Important Bird and Biodiversity Areas". He is actively fighting against bird poaching and trade, as well as in advocating the reformation of policies for the same. He believes that studying different aspects of human-wildlife relations, and conducting sensitization activities in community level would contribute significantly to wildlife conservation.

Ramesh Kumar Poudel

Ramesh Kumar Poudel is affiliated with Kantipur Daily as a journalist since 6 years. Before that, he was associated with Nagarik Daily. Born on 7 September 1978 in Naryangarh Chitwan, he had started professional journalism from October 2000 at local Chitwan Post Daily.

Mr. Poudel is the winner of 'Environmental Journalism award' in 2005 AD awarded by Nepal Forum of Environmental Journalists (NEFEJ). He has also been honored by Press Chautari Chitwan in 'Environmental Journalism



Award' category in 2076 BS. Further, he is the winner of National Photo Competition, organized by Photo Journalist Club in 'Nature and Wildlife' category in 2016. Mr. Poudel centers his columns in subjects like forest, wildlife, protected areas, environment, rivers/ streams, birds, and local issues/ affairs. He has been writing about One-horned Rhinoceros, Bengal Tiger, Gharial, and other rare wildlife. His columns on Owls and other birds are regularly published in Kantipur Dainik. He has also rescued Owls.

Mr. Poudel has around 200 news, articles and features about forest, environment, birds and animals in Chitwan Post Dainik, Samaya Rastriya Saptahik, Nagarik National Daily and Kantipur National Daily. He frequently gives his opinions about special environmental issues in local Synergy FM.

Satish A. Pande

Residing in Pune, India, Dr. Satish A. Pande is a radiologist by profession. However, he is rigorously involved in research, conservation, habitat conservation, sensitization camps, rescue and rehabilitation of Owls. Dr. Pande has completed his PhD in 'Breeding Biology, Nesting Habitat, and Diet of the Rock Eagle-Owl (Bubo bengalensis)'. He is the director of ELA foundation.



Dr. Pande has pioneered 'Owl Festival' in India and organized the festival three times so far. An idol for Indian youth and conservationists, he has been awarded with 8 different awards/ recognitions from USA, Scotland and India for his contribution. He is conducting research on habitat selection and breeding biology of eight species of Owls in India. He has 22 scientific articles on Owls. He has also written about life history of 5 different Owls and published brochure on 'Indian Owls'. He is the author of two books on Owls. So far, he has rescued and rehabilitated 240 Owls. In his leadership, 'International Owl Conference' was organized in 2019 in Pune India.

Founded in 2003, with the maxim "Seek and You Shall Find", Creative Academy is a renowned academic institution located at Kirtipur-09, Kathmandu. The students are actively involved in nature and environmental conservation by organizing myriad of activities including Bird Watching, Mini Paper Zoo, School Waste Management, Eco Parent's Fair, Hoarding Board Display, Kirtipur Biodiversity Research Project, Creative Museum and so forth.


